The wildest stretch of the Coosa River began about 14 miles north of Wetumpka and ended at the bridge that linked the two sides of town. So great were the falls and standing waves that you could hear the water roar a mile from the stream. "Devil's Staircase," as it was known, is where Jordan Dam would be completed in 1928.

Forty years later, a second dam was constructed on Jordan Lake, Walter Bouldin Dam. Bouldin Dam has the largest generating capacity of Alabama Power's hydro facilities and is unusual in design because it was built on a canal.



Did you know....

The roots of many phrases and words we use today can be traced to "life afloat?" In the next couple of newsletters, I'll share nautical sayings that have "come ashore over the years" courtesy of BoatU.S. Magazine's contributing editor, Frank Lanier.

A cup of Joe

The nickname for coffee came about due to the reforms initiated in 1913 by Josephus Daniels, then secretary of the United States Navy under President Woodrow Wilson. One such reform was the elimination of the officers' wine mess, a policy received less than enthusiastically by many. Since that time a cup of the strongest drink allowed on board U.S. naval ships has been referred to as "a cup of Joe."

Bigwigs

Strangely enough, this is one bit of seafaring lingo that pretty much means what it says. Senior officers of Britain's Royal Navy at one time actually did wear boldly large wigs after the style of the day.

Carry a bone in her teeth

Phrase used to describe a ship sailing fast enough to foam the water in front of her bow.

Crow's nest

Name for the highest lookout station aloft, a term most likely derived from the old Norse practice of bringing cages of ravens aboard to assist in navigation. If the navigator was in doubt as to the direction of the nearest landfall, the cage was hoisted aloft, and a raven released. The bird invariably headed for land, the navigator noted the direction of flight, and plotted accordingly. Best guess is the lookout stationed aloft likely shared his perch with the feathered members of the crew from time to time, thus the name.

Footloose

Uninhibited or spontaneous. The bottom of a triangular sail is called the foot, and a "loose-footed sail" is one attached fore and aft, but unsecured along the boom itself and able to dance freely in the wind if the claw (aft end) is freed.

Gamming

A "gam" was a mutual visit between the crews of whaling ships when they happened to meet abroad. It was there the latest news and gossip was exchanged and yarns were spun amid plenty of song, dance, food, and drink. The word "gam" came from whaleman slang for a pod of whales.

Hard up

Destitute, fallen on hard or trying times, this is derived from "hard up the helm," an order to place the tiller as far to windward as possible during difficult weather, thus turning the ship's head away from the wind so she might ride easier.

Hunki dori

Commodore Matthew Perry's historic visit to Japan in July 1853 began an era of openness and commercial intercourse between east and west. Yokohama was one of Japan's busiest ports at the time, and the main street of the waterfront district, Honki-dori, became famous for its ability to provide an abundance of pleasures to sailors while in port.

While Honki-dori was relatively straightforward and easy to navigate, the winding side streets and back roads were not only confusing but potentially dangerous to unwary sailors (particularly those of the inebriated persuasion) who often fell victim to robbery or worse. Advice was if you stayed on Honki-dori you could probably find everything you desired in relative safety, hence the street name association with everything being OK.

Bootleg

This term for the smuggling of illegal liquor was derived from the sailor's ruse of bringing in contraband by hiding it in the tops of the sea boots.

Identify the snake and take note of the color, pattern and size if unable to identify the type of snake



Remove ring or jewelries on the affected part or anything that may constrict the area once it swells



Place the bitten part below the victim's Heart



Wash and clean the affected site with soap and water



Seek medical attention immediately



DO NOT

Attempt to kill or capture the snake



Attempt to cut the wound



Block the blood flow out of wound



Suck the venom out



Give any food or water by mouth



Use traditional remedies because they have no proven benefit in treating snake bites

January 24, 2022

The Lake Jordan Home Owners/Boat Owners Association Quarterly Membership Meeting was called to order by

President Jeff Royal at 7:00pm on January 24th, 2022 at Camp Chandler on Lake Jordan.

President Royal thanked everyone for being there and declared that a quorum was present to conduct business. He welcomed everyone, and new members and guests introduced themselves.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes from the October 25th, 2021, Quarterly HOBO Association meeting. The motion carried.

Brett Wilkinson presented the Financial Report dated December 31, 2021, with an ending non-restricted cash balance of \$36,950.94.

The 2022 Lake Jordan HOBO Operating Budget (Resolution 22-01) was presented to the membership for review and approval. After a brief discussion, a motion to approve the budget as written was made and seconded. The motion carried.



No additional nominations were made from the members who were present at the meeting. A motion was made and seconded to close nominations and elect the Individuals as submitted by the Nominating Committee. The motion carried. Jeff turned the meeting over to President Elect Kim Adams who presided for the

remainder of the January Quarterly meeting. Kim's first order of business was recognizing and thanking Jeff for his outstanding service as President of the Lake Jordan HOBO Association for the past 4 years. An appreciation gift was presented to Jeff for a job well done!

The guest speaker for the meeting was Elmore County Commission Chairman Troy Stubbs, County Commissioner for District 3. Commissioner Stubbs talked about the 5 Pillars of a Great Community. Opportunities are evaluated and decisions are made based on the impact they will have regarding infrastructure, education, healthcare, public safety, and economic vitality in the Community. Infrastructure not only includes roads and bridges but also all the broadband expansion that is taking place in the county. Broadband is an important tool in the expansion and success of all 5 Pillars. People make decisions about moving to Elmore County based on education, healthcare services, safety, etc. As Elmore County grows, the quality of life for Elmore County citizens is improved by the expansion of all these services. Broadband and Internet access is being made available to people in Rural Areas from funds allocated from the Federal Rescue Plan funding and is now considered an essential service for education, healthcare, etc. Commissioner Stubbs also talked about the mega-prison that will be located on state owned land in Elmore County. This prison will be the Central location for physical and mental health for prisoners which will bring additional high-quality jobs to Elmore County. Commissioner Stubbs updated the membership about the Waste Management trash situation in Elmore County and the bid process to contract with a new trash service. He informed the membership that measures that are being taken to remedy the problems that

Water Quality – Judy May reported that the Alabama Water Watch Office held virtual recertification classes for chemical and bacterial testing. Lake Jordan was very well represented, and we now have 6 new monitors certified. The Lake Jordan HOBO Association covers all expenses for the testing which is not the norm on other Lakes. All former water monitors that still have test kits, please return them to Judy. Please contact Judy at frudymay@elmore.rr.com if you are interested in being certified.

Lake Safety – Dave Kowalski announced that the Christmas Tree Habitat project will be held March 16th. Alabama Power will provide boats starting at 9:00 AM at Bonners. Lunch from Subway will be provided. Please contact Dave Kowalski at the2skies@att.net if you are interested in participating. Dave announced that there is a new water patrol officer on the lake. He further reported that hazard buoys are still in the process of being replaced on various parts of the lake but if you see one missing, please call the marine police at 800.432.7389. Dave reminded everyone to do safety checks as boating season is just around the corner. Check your life jackets, boat houses, and make sure your GFI receptacles are functioning correctly.

Governmental Relations – Logan Gray reported that the Legislature was currently in a Special Session to allocate the funds from the Federal Rescue Plan. The funds will go toward Broadband infrastructure which includes benefitting hospitals and nursing homes and replenishing the funding that was paid out for unemployment. The Legislature will resume its Regular Session the following week.

HOBO Scholarship Committee – Gayla Littlejohn updated the membership about the HOBO Scholarship Committee. The deadline for submitting an application is February 1st if you know of an upcoming senior that would be interested in applying. Information about the criteria and requirements needed to be eligible to receive the scholarship grant money and applications on site at the Quarterly meeting. For this year only, the Committee is allowing volunteer hours from areas outside of Lake Jordan to count toward the volunteer requirement.
