Electrical Shock Drowning - What You Don't Know Could Kill You

What is an Electric Shock Drowning (ESD)?

ESD happens when a swimmer comes into contact with electrical current. The current – in this case, alternating current (AC) – causes skeletal muscular paralysis, lasting for only an instant, but long enough to incapacitate a swimmer allowing him to drown.

Where does the electricity come from?

The electric current “leaks” from boats and docks into the water. It can come from frayed wires, improperly wired systems or an AC grounding system that is damaged or malfunctioning.

What causes people to be electrocuted?

Electrical current will always attempt to return to its source in order to complete the electrical circuit. Electrical current is resourceful and will find any way to do that, taking the path of least resistance and most conductivity (anything that will help the current move along its path). The way alternating current (AC) searches for its source is the most deadly for humans because it takes only a small amount of AC to disrupt the electrical impulses that control our muscles and nerves.

Why does ESD happen in fresh water and not salt water?

We go back to conductivity for the answer. Fresh water is not a good electrical conductor. Because it is not a good conductor, the alternating current looks for something better. A human body in fresh water becomes that something better. The high amount of salt in humans make our bodies far better conductors of electrical current than fresh water.

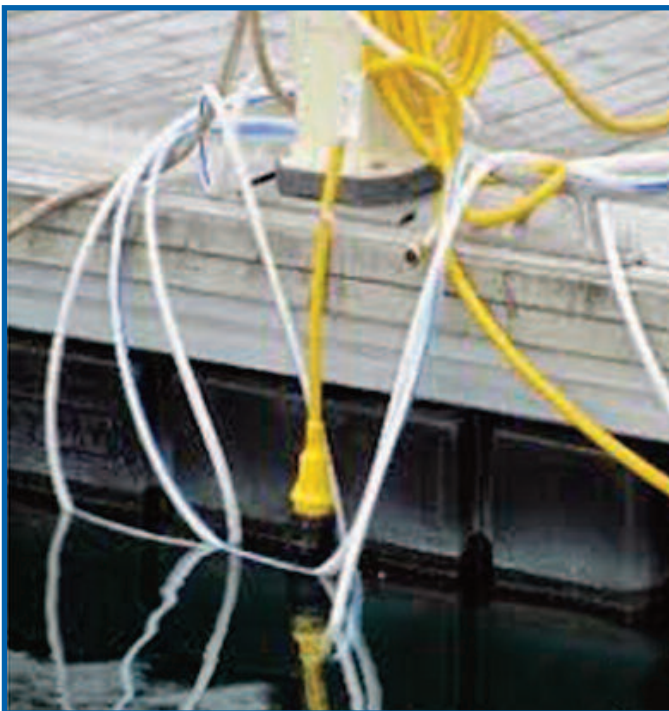
How much electricity is needed for this to happen?

Not much at all. It takes only small amounts of leaking AC to incapacitate or electrocute a person. As small an amount as 15 milliamps can cause paralysis, 100 milliamps – or a third of the amount of electricity need to light a 40-watt light bulb – can kill a person in seconds. In comparison, a double AA battery produces 2400 milliamps per hour.

Can you tell if water is unsafe to swim in?

No, but here are some tips that could keep you safe.

- Never swim within 100 yards of any fresh water marina or boatyard.
- If you have a boat, have it tested to make sure it is not leaking electricity. You can buy a clamp meter and test it yourself.
- Have a qualified electrician do any electric work needed on a dock or on your boat.
- Do not use a household extension cords for powering your docked boat.



If you feel "tingly" in the water, you could be at risk for shock. In that case you should:

- Have someone turn off the shore power connection at the meter base and/or unplug shore power cords.
- Tell anyone in the water to move away from the dock.
- Stop anyone else from entering the water.
- If you believe someone has been shocked, reach, throw, row, but don't go into the water to get to anyone who you think has been shocked.
- Call for help. Use 911 or VHF Channel 16.
- Try CPR on the person; don't stop until trained help arrives.

2. DANGBASS Club

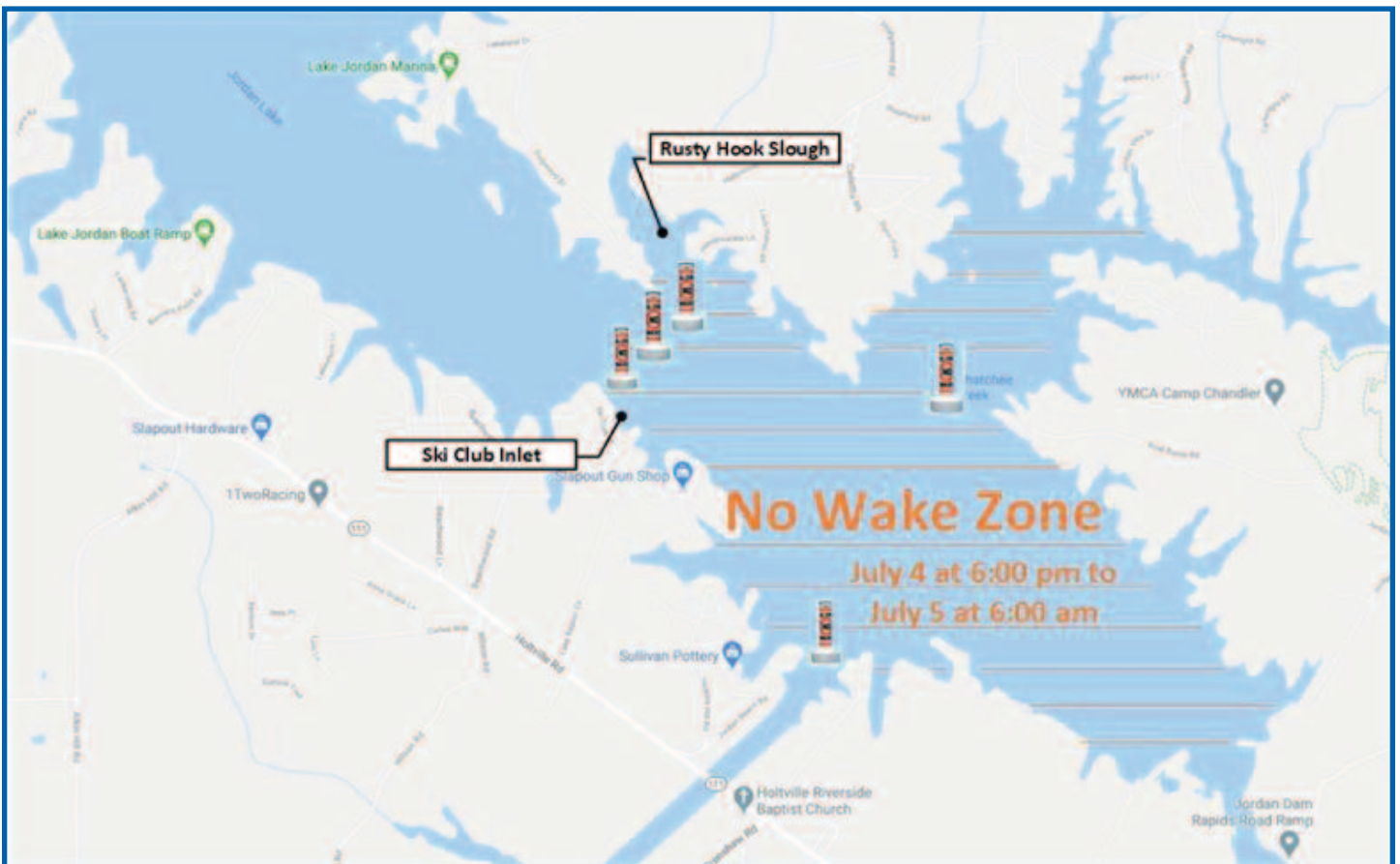

No Wake Zone for Evening of 4th of July

A mandatory No Wake Zone will be implemented by ALEA Marine Police for the entire width of Lake Jordan from Lake Jordan Dam to Rusty Hook Slough and Ski Club Inlet from 6:00 pm on July 4th, 2020 to 6:00 am on July 5th, 2020. ALEA will be enforcing the mandatory no wake zone.

A “No Wake Zone” is an area within which vessels are required to travel at idling speed – slow speed that creates no appreciable wake. All boat operators should use proper navigation lighting and not use alcohol while operating a vessel. ALEA also encourages the usage of personal flotation devices.



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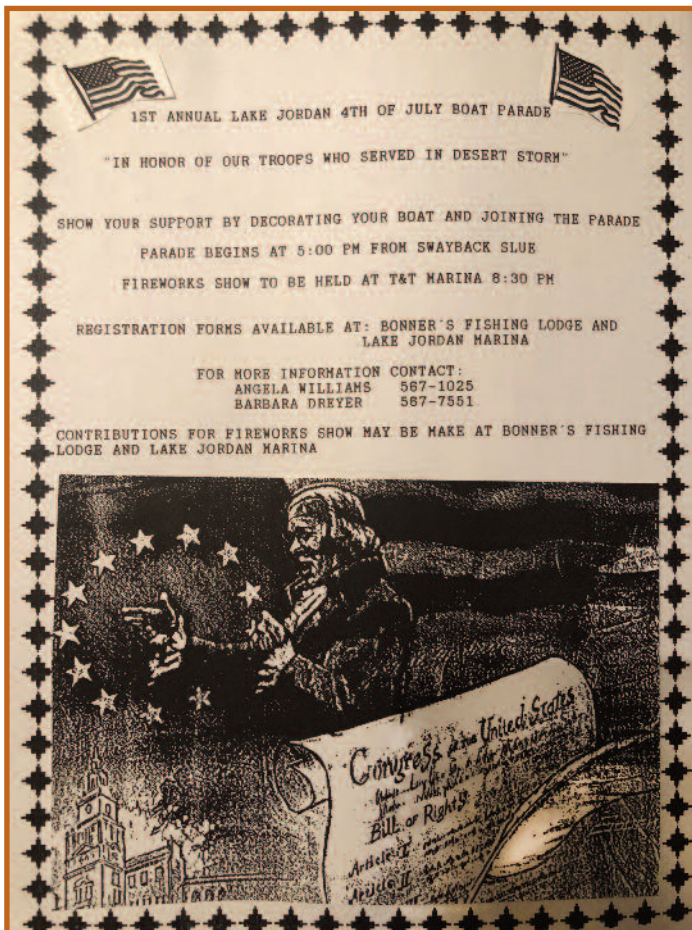

FOR THE LOVE OF ALABAMA, TAKE YOUR CENSUS.

The U.S. Census Bureau conducts a census of the United States every 10 years, going all the way back to 1790. The data collected during the census is used in a variety of ways that affect decisions regarding community services provided to residents and the distribution of more than \$675 billion in federal funds to local, state and tribal governments each year. This funding supports local programs for schools, health care, community assistance, infrastructure and other important needs. The census also determines the number of representatives each state will have in Congress.

The census counts every person – both adults and children – living in the United States. This information helps monitor changes in communities and is used to identify and address public service needs such as health care, education, public safety, housing, food, and rural access to broadband.

How to Respond

1. Complete it online at www.my2020census.gov.
2. Call the U.S. Census Bureau toll-free 844-330-2020. Telephone assistance is also available in multiple languages:
3. Return the paper form included with your invitation letter sent to you via the U.S Postal Service.

Why Should You Respond:

Taking the Census helps with federal funds coming to your community, adding to your quality of life. Plain and simple.

Alabama Department of Economic and Community Affairs Director Kenneth Boswell noted “As of June 3rd, we (Alabama) have had 58.6% participation, and that’s really not good.” We want to make sure that we solidify the federal funds for the next decade. If we don’t get our numbers up close to 100%, we stand a chance of losing federal funds, and lose more representation in Washington. In the 2010 Census, we had 72.5% participation. ***“If we get 72.5% again we’re going to lose a seat in Washington, and if we go behind that number we’ll lose two seats.”*** To add insult to injury, the legislature proposed a gas tax bill and those funds are distributed based on the Census count, meaning we will drop drastically. I don’t know a person out there that doesn’t like driving on good roads and bridges. This is a chance for individuals to really make a difference in their own lives and the lives of their communities for years to come.

For the love of Alabama, take the census.
